Beyond the Blue

1972, Christmas Eve, humanity was given a gift. It was a portrait of the Earth as a vivid globe. It became known as the "Blue Marble" and is one of the most reproduced images in history. The image was taken on December 7, 1972 from a distance of around 29,000 kilometers (18,000 miles) from the plant's surface. It was taken by the crew of the Apollo 17 spacecraft on its way to the Moon. Photographing the Moon was not part of the mission of the Apollo 17 crew, but they did and we are thankful for that. Crew members Eugene Cerman, Ronald Evans and Harrison Schmitt are all credited with this iconic photograph. At the time, the crew was 28,000 miles from home.

The detailed image of our planet, framed against the black void of space, captured the awe of spaceflight in a single frame. It is certainly a moment of awe 50 years later
